




Don't panic if you can't, find a poster and the names and photographs are there.



Before entering the school building, Reception staff have checks that they need to carry out. Each visitor is given an information leaflet.





#### How else do we keep you safe in school?



#### Staff

People who work at our school have had the special checks done and they wear these lanyards around their neck which also has their photographs on them.





#### How else do we keep you safe in school?

#### **Visitors**

All visitors go to the main office and Mrs Mackey, Mrs Smith or Mrs Hynds will carry out any checks and give them a lanyard like the ones below.



An adult wearing this lanyard can walk around the school without a staff member.



An adult wearing this lanyard must always have someone from our school staff with them.





#### How else do we keep you safe in school?

#### **Visitors**

There is another type of visitor that we may have in school. These visitors are call Governors and they help Mrs Cross. They wear black lanyards that look like this.

An adult wearing this lanyard can walk around the school without a staff member.











Although all of the Governors keep us safe, like the DSLs, there is a special Governor called Mr Paul Owens.





# How else do we keep you safe in school?

All adults must wear a sticker or lanyard. Also adults should not be using their mobile phones within school unless DSLs need to use it for an emergency.





If you see a visitor in school without a sticker or lanyard or on their phone, please tell an adult in your year group straight away!









# Using technology safely and keeping safe.

Seesaw or get a grown up to email it.


If it is a message from a group leave that group or block the person.



- You should never be asked to keep secrets about touch.



#### What is bullying?



Bullying (including Cyberbullying) Bullying is defined as

"behaviour by an individual or group, usually repeated over time, which intentionally hurts another individual or group either physically or emotionally".





#### What is bullying?

Bullying often starts with little events and it is behaviour that hurts someone else – such as

- name calling,
- > hitting, pushing,
- > spreading hurtful and untruthful rumours,
- > threatening or undermining someone;
- > mocking;
- making offensive comments;
- > taking belongings;
- > inappropriate touching;
- producing offensive graffiti;
- > or always leaving someone out of groups.










Bullying can also be known as Child on Child Abuse (this used to be called Peer on Peer but lots of children found this difficult to remember)

Child means children in your class, year group or you come into contact with inside or out of school.

Any of these behaviours must be reported to an adult and we will take this seriously and help and support you.

Sometimes you might think it is too embarrassing to say but you MUST speak up.










#### Types of Bullying




#### 'Cyberbullying':

involves sending inappropriate or hurtful text messages, emails or instant messages, posting malicious material online (e.g. on social networking websites) or sending or posting offensive or degrading images and videos





#### Types of Bullying




Racist and Religious Bullying:

A range of hurtful behaviour, both physical and psychological, that makes a person feel unwelcome, marginalised, excluded, powerless or worthless because of their colour, ethnicity, culture, faith community, national origin or national status.





### Types of Bullying




Sexual, Sexist and Transphobic Bullying: includes any behaviour, whether physical or non-physical, where sexuality is used as a weapon by boys or girls.





### Types of Bullying




Homophobic Bullying: targets someone because of their sexual orientation (or perceived sexual orientation).





#### Types of Bullying



#### Disablist Bullying:

targets a young person solely based on their disability, this can include manipulative bullying where a perpetrator forces the victim to act in a certain way, or exploiting a certain aspect of the victims disability.





#### **IMPORTANT**

At John Fletcher of Madeley Primary School we do not tolerate any of these behaviours which we have discussed which are linked to bullying.




